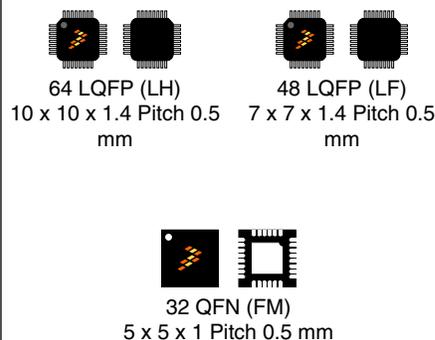

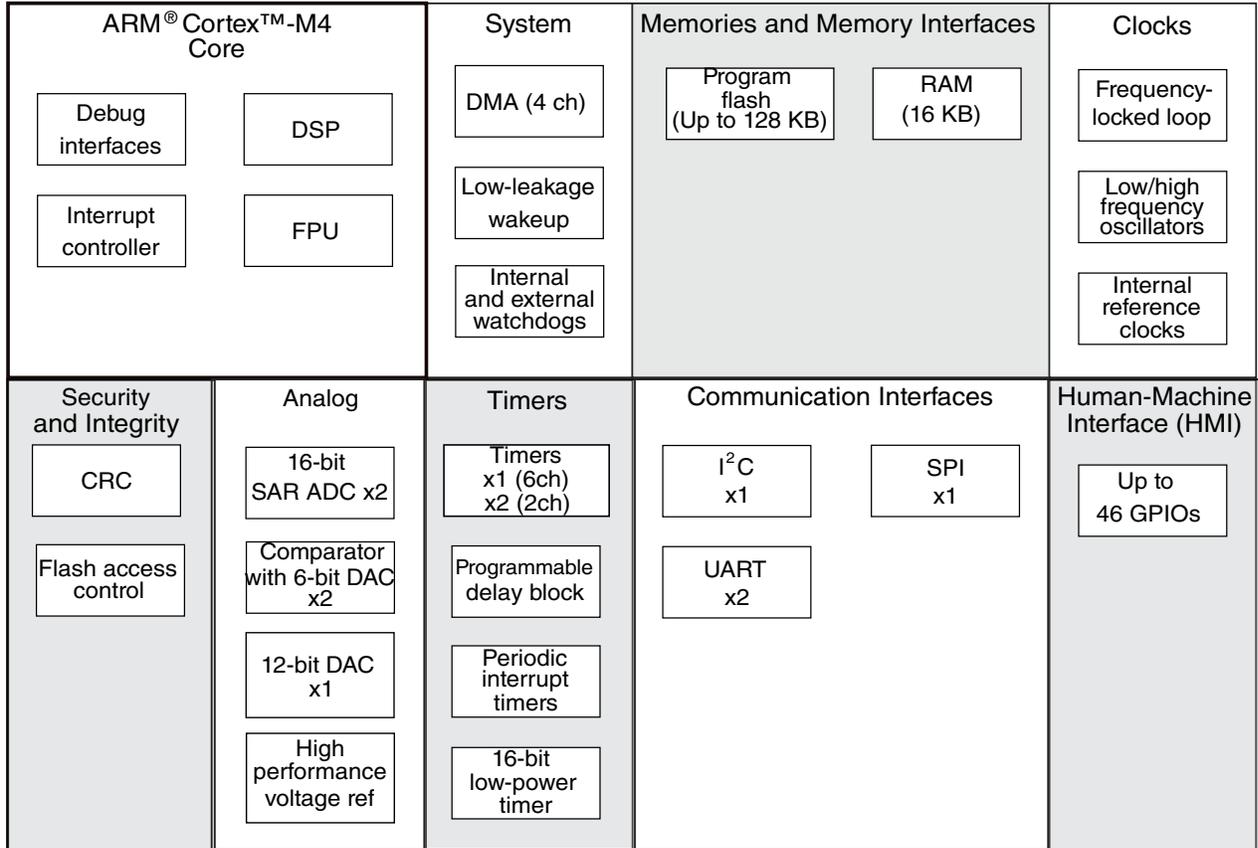

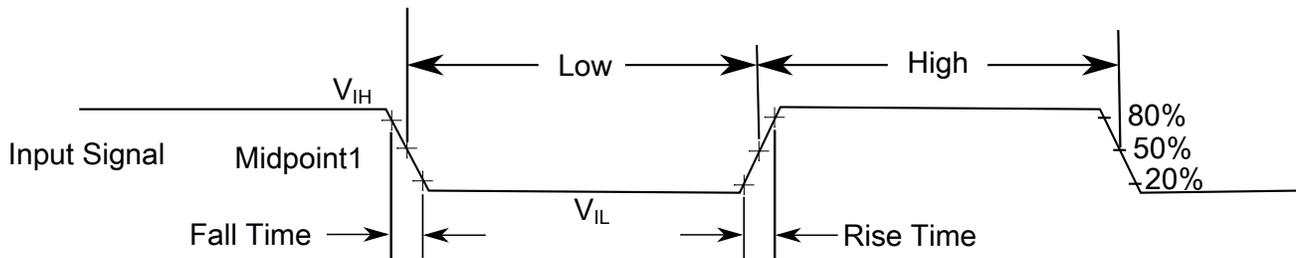

## 2 General

### 2.1 AC electrical characteristics

Unless otherwise specified, propagation delays are measured from the 50% to the 50% point, and rise and fall times are measured at the 20% and 80% points, as shown in the following figure.



The midpoint is  $V_{IL} + (V_{IH} - V_{IL}) / 2$

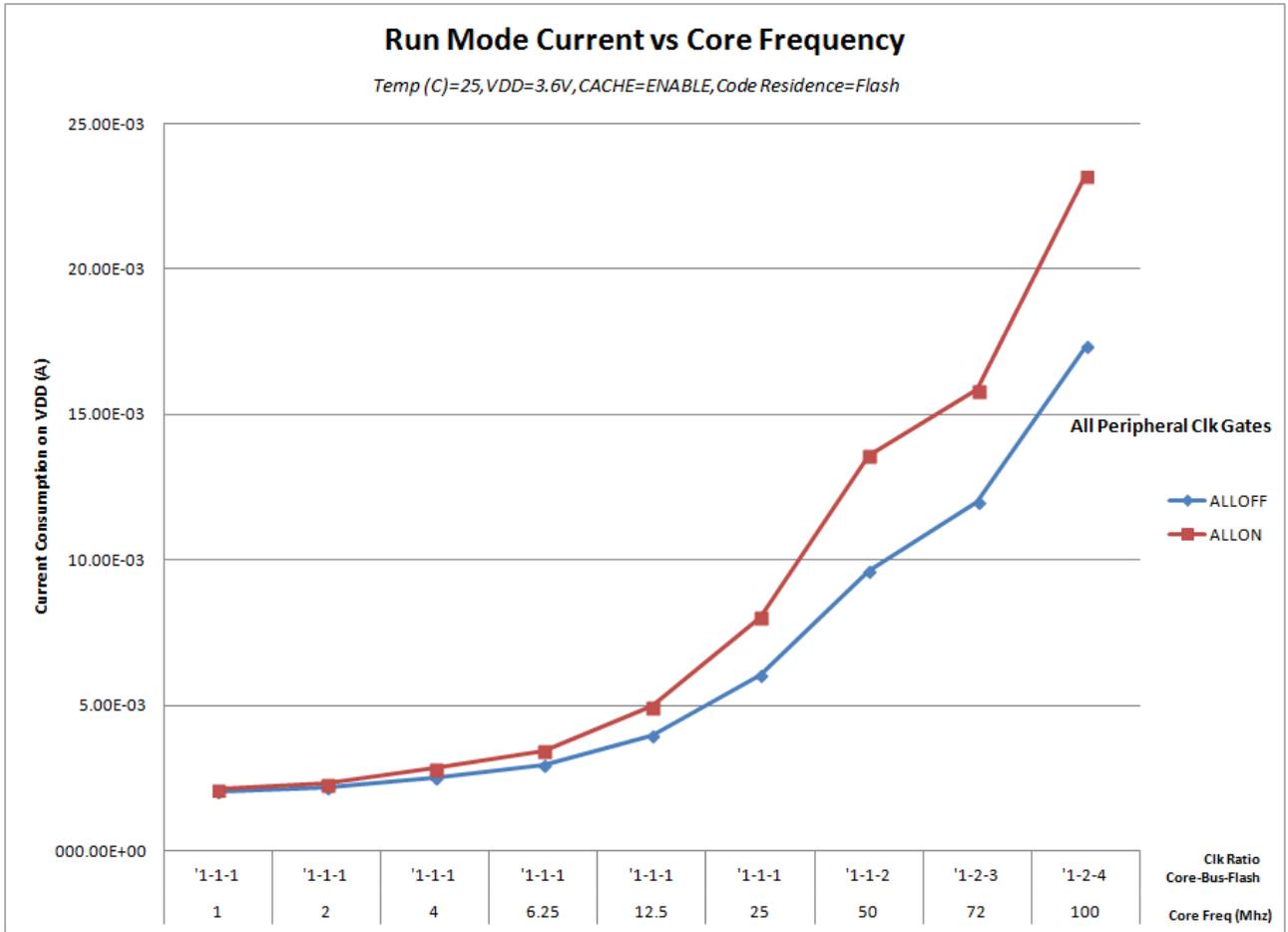

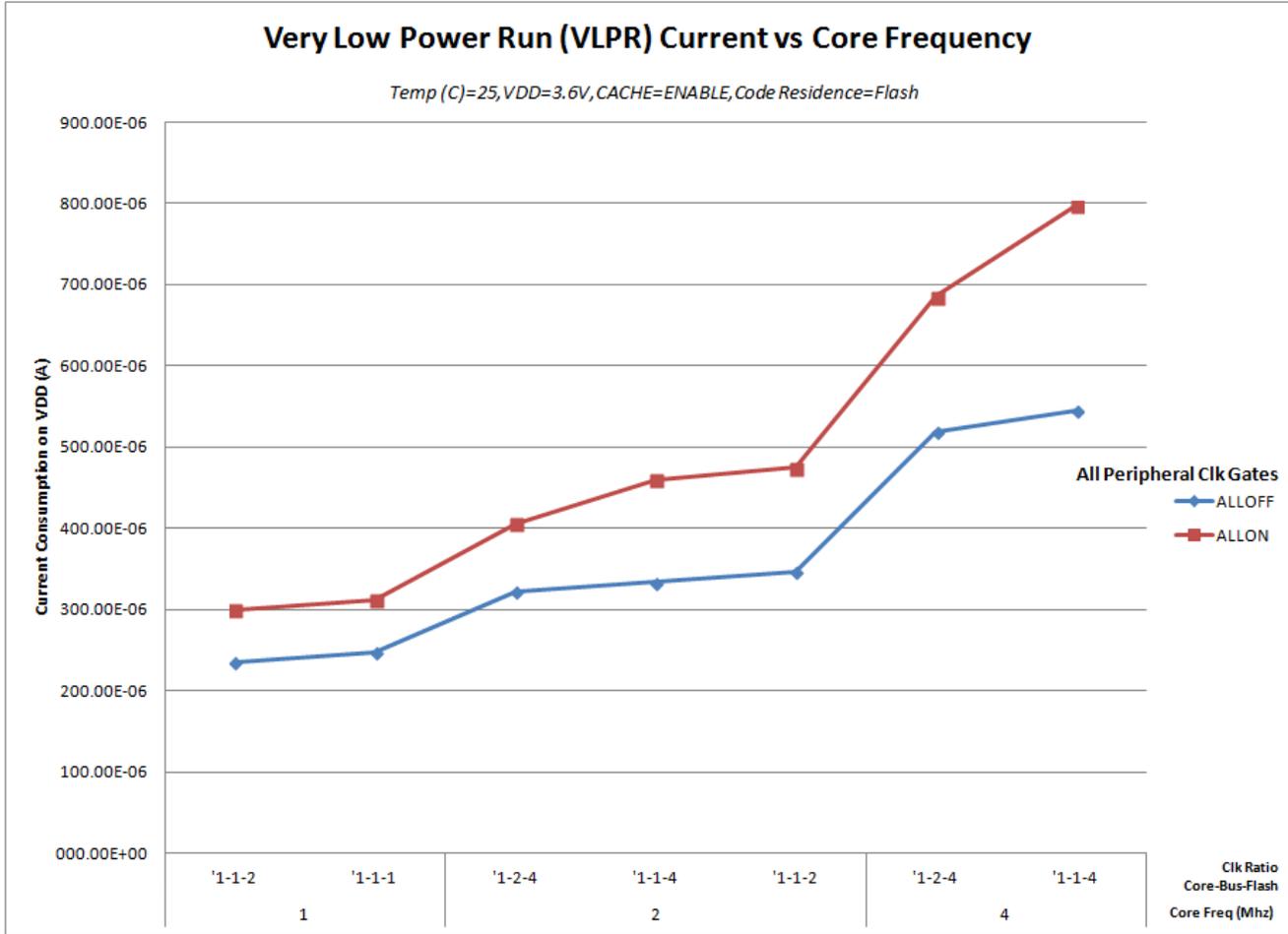


Figure 4. VLPR mode supply current vs. core frequency




Figure 5. Serial wire clock input timing




Figure 6. Serial wire data timing

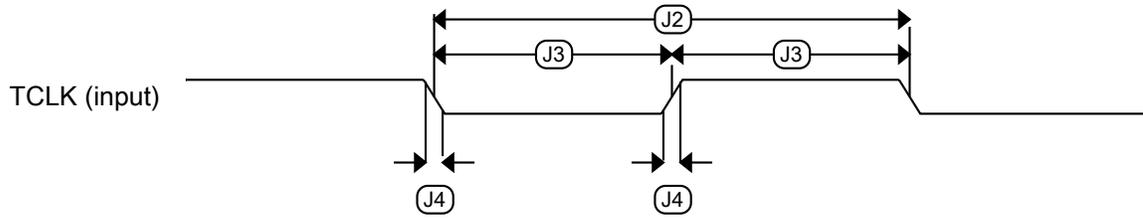

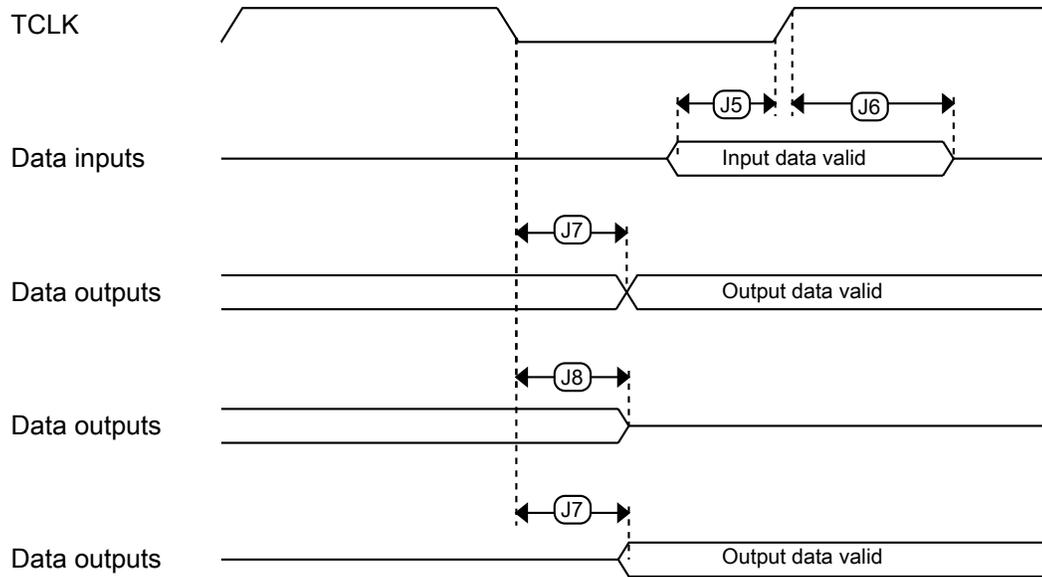

**Figure 8. Boundary scan (JTAG) timing**

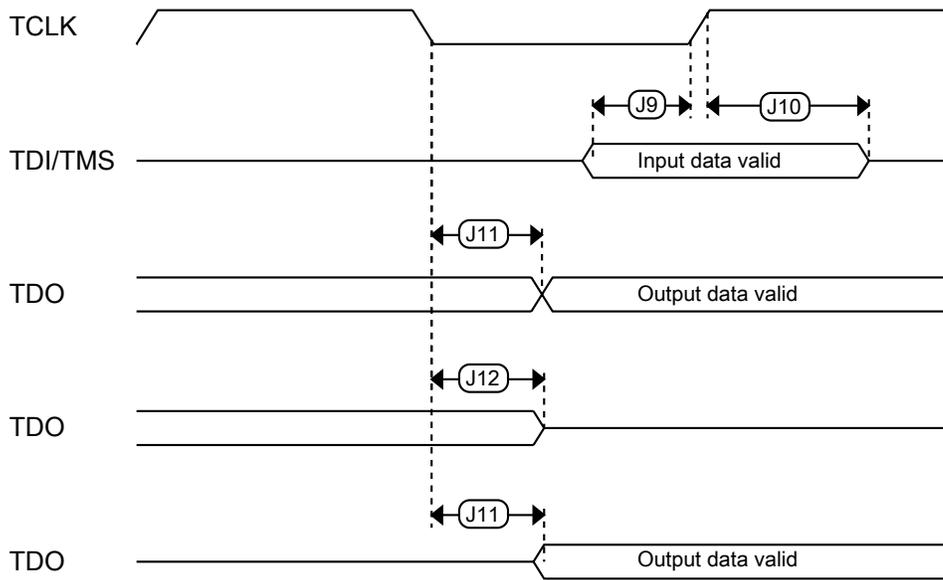


Figure 9. Test Access Port timing




Figure 10. TRST timing

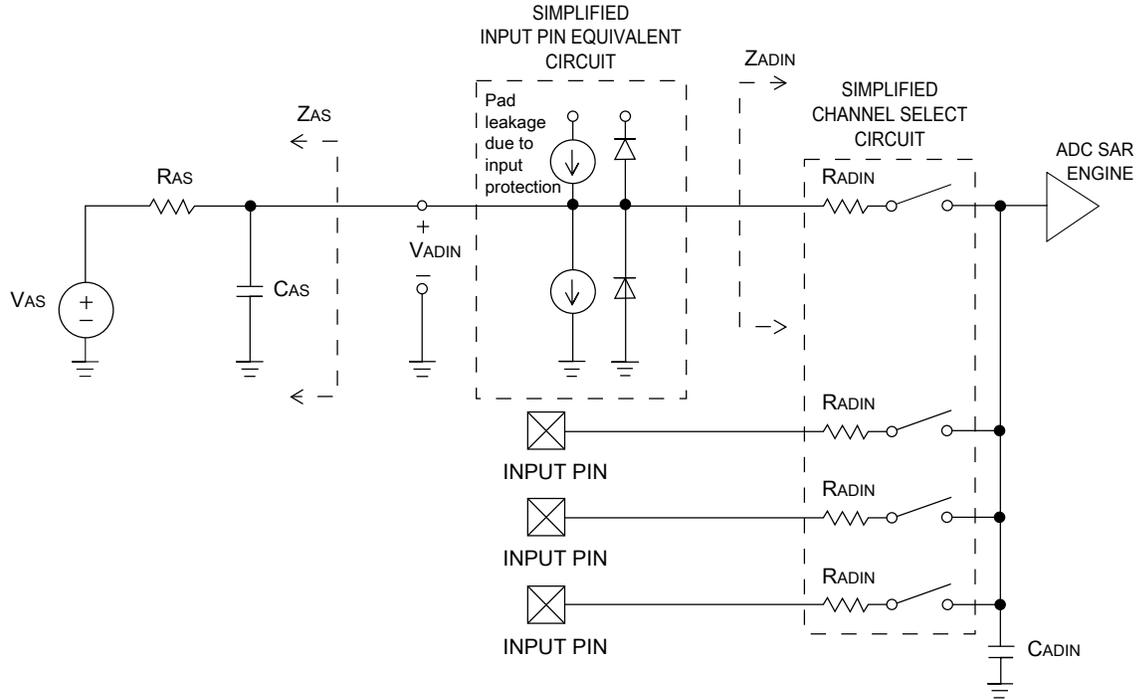


Figure 11. ADC input impedance equivalency diagram





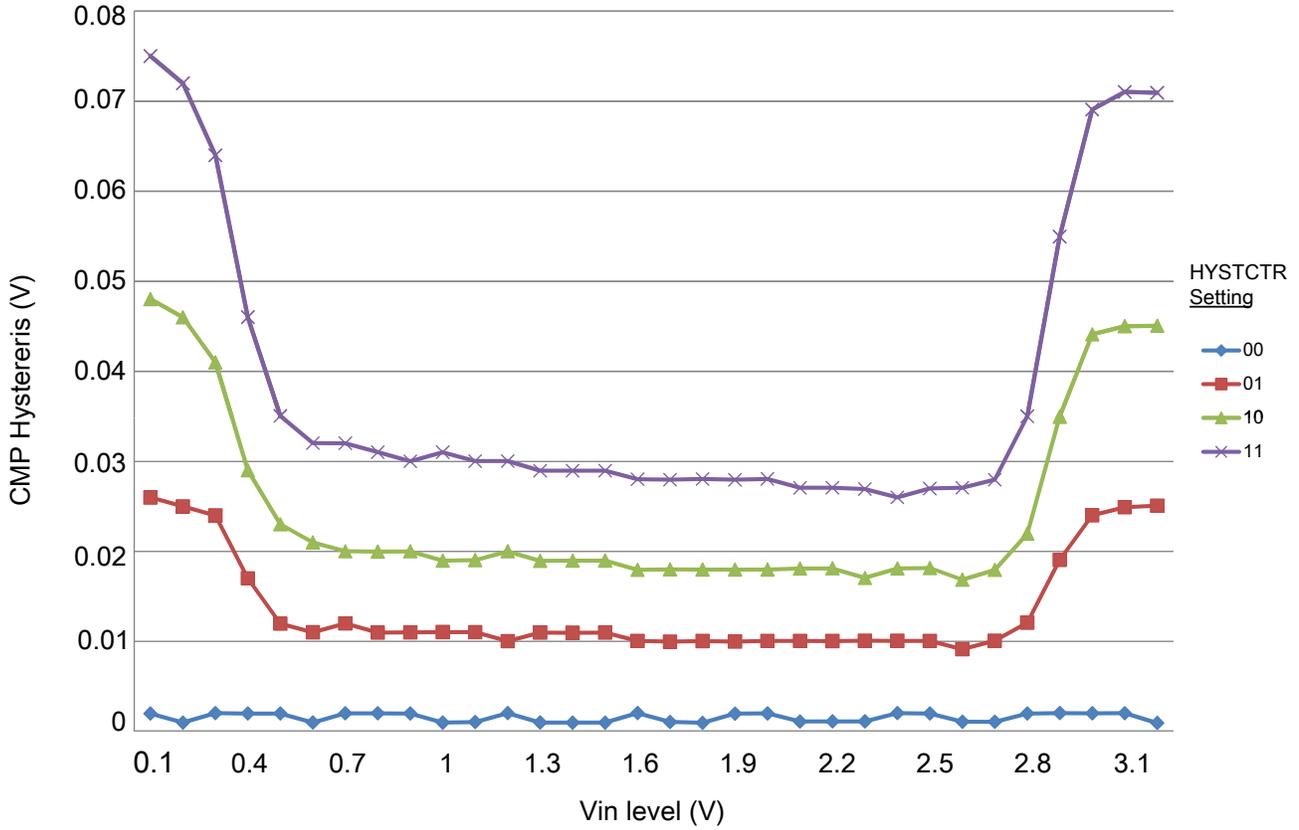


Figure 14. Typical hysteresis vs. Vin level (VDD = 3.3 V, PMODE = 0)

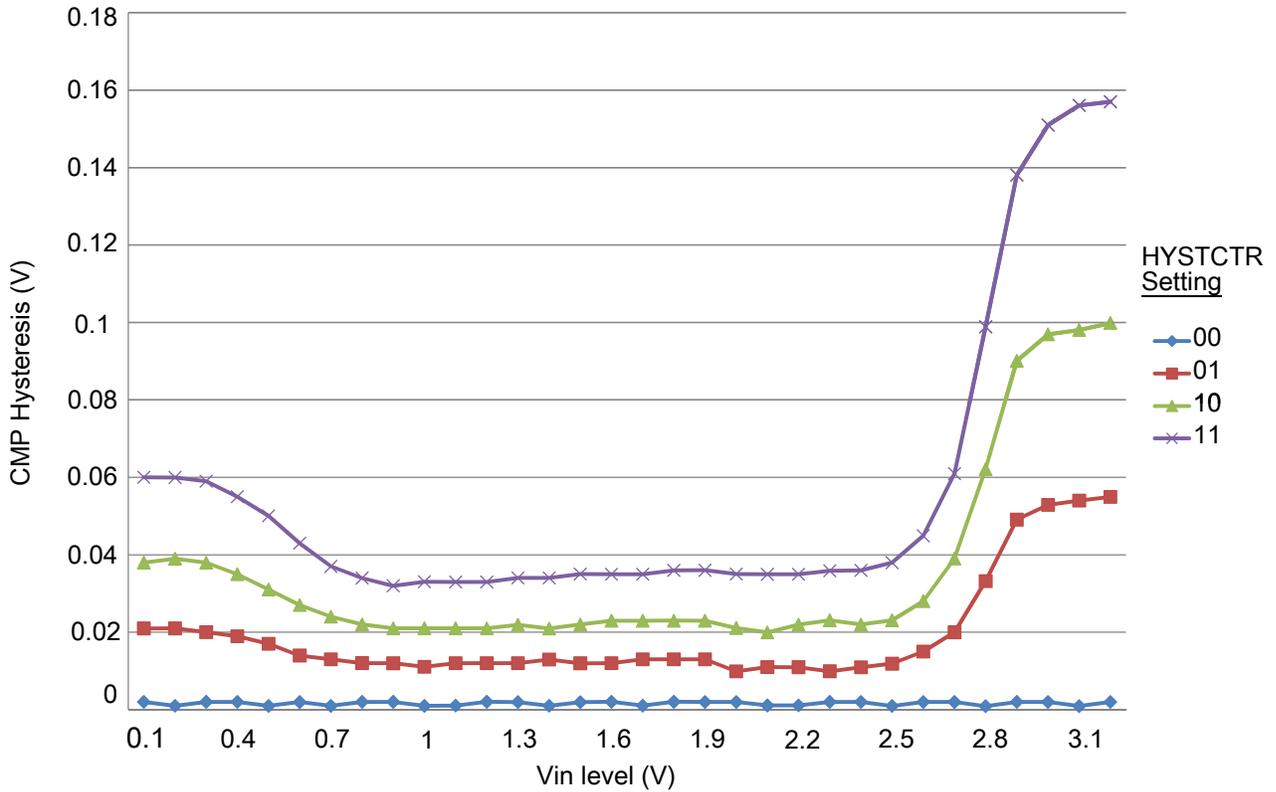


Figure 15. Typical hysteresis vs. Vin level (VDD = 3.3 V, PMODE = 1)

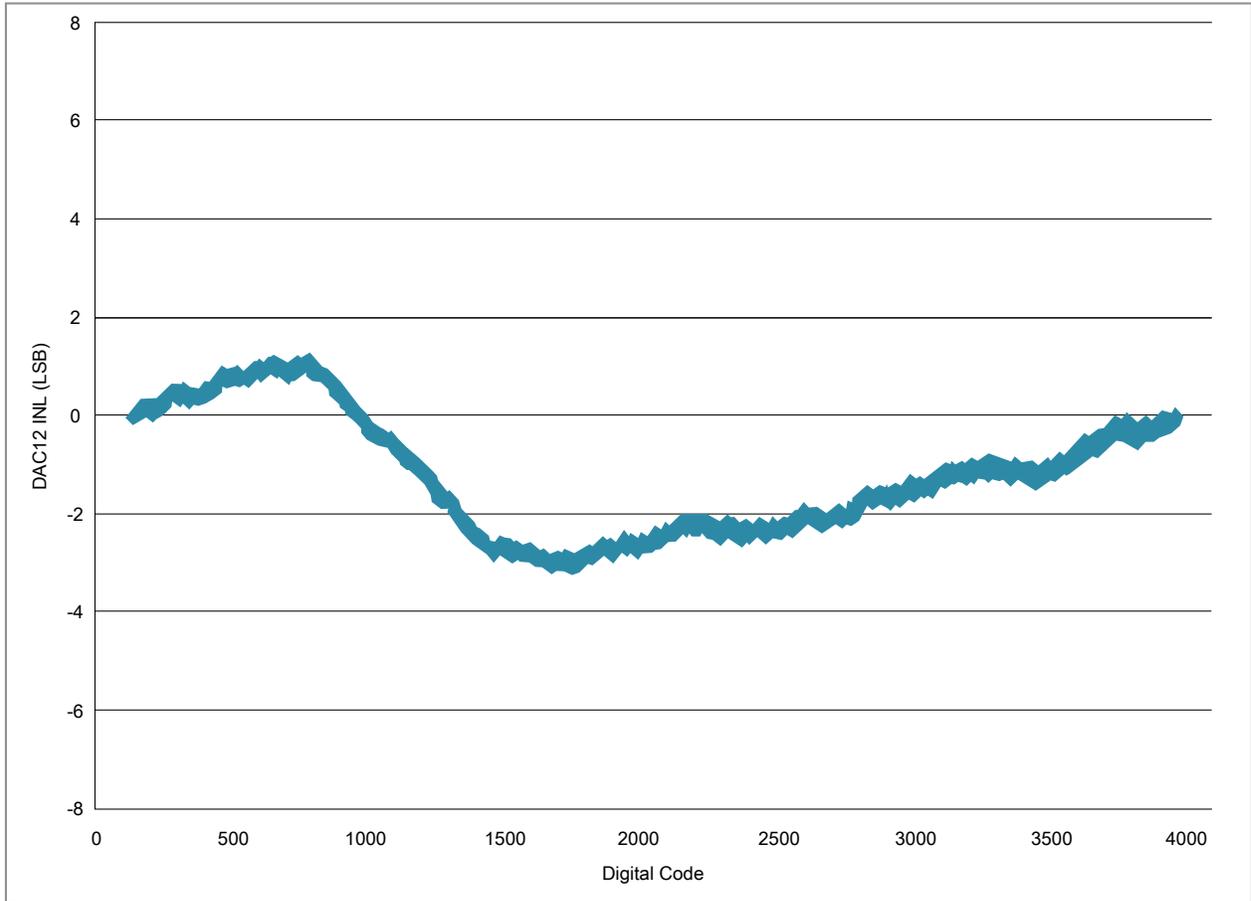


Figure 16. Typical INL error vs. digital code

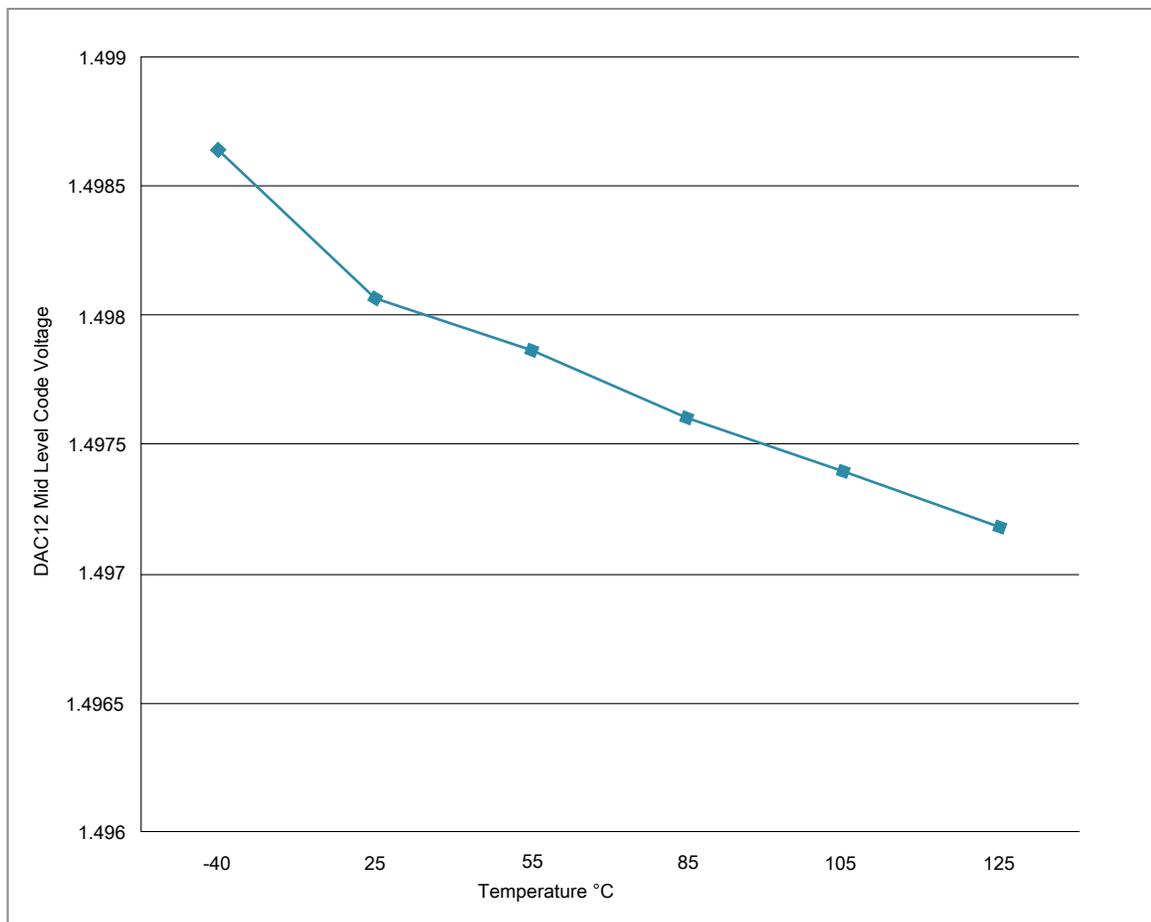


Figure 17. Offset at half scale vs. temperature






**Figure 18. DSPI classic SPI timing — master mode**

**Figure 19. DSPI classic SPI timing — slave mode**

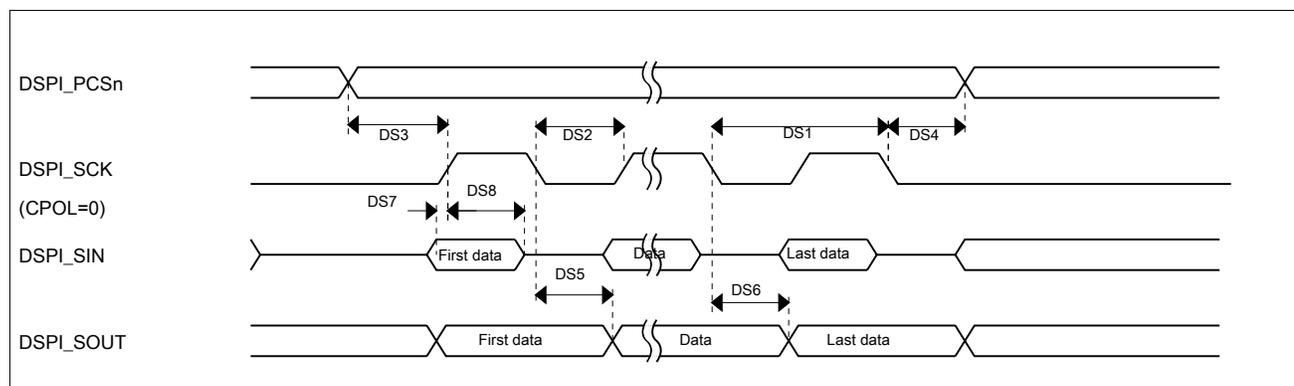



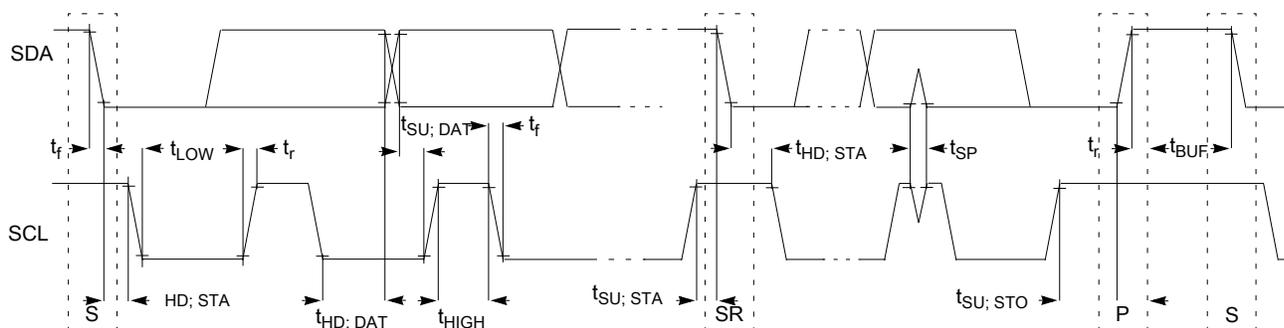


Figure 22. Timing definition for devices on the I<sup>2</sup>C bus

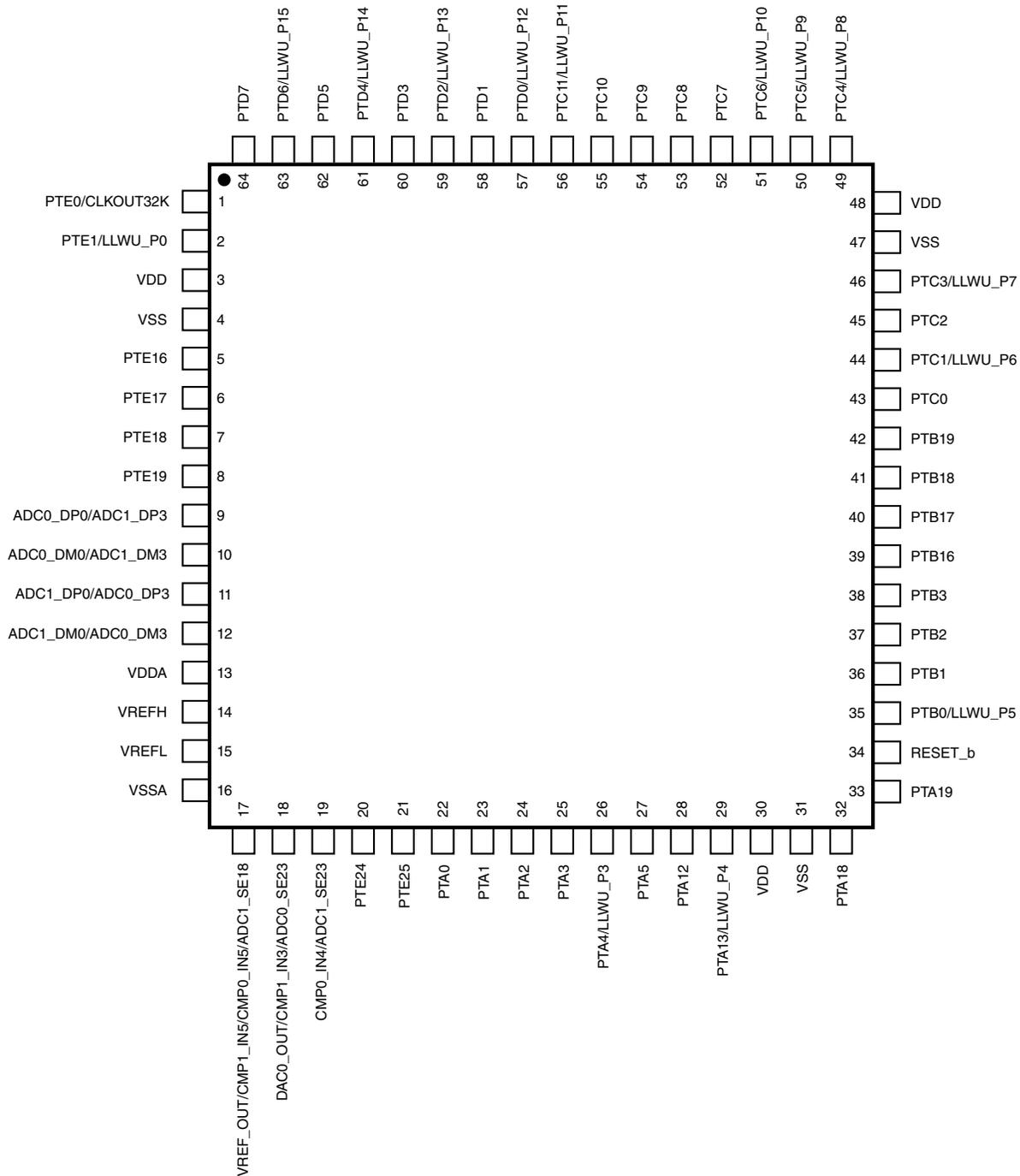


Figure 23. KV30F 64 LQFP pinout diagram (top view)




Figure 24. KV30F 48 LQFP pinout diagram

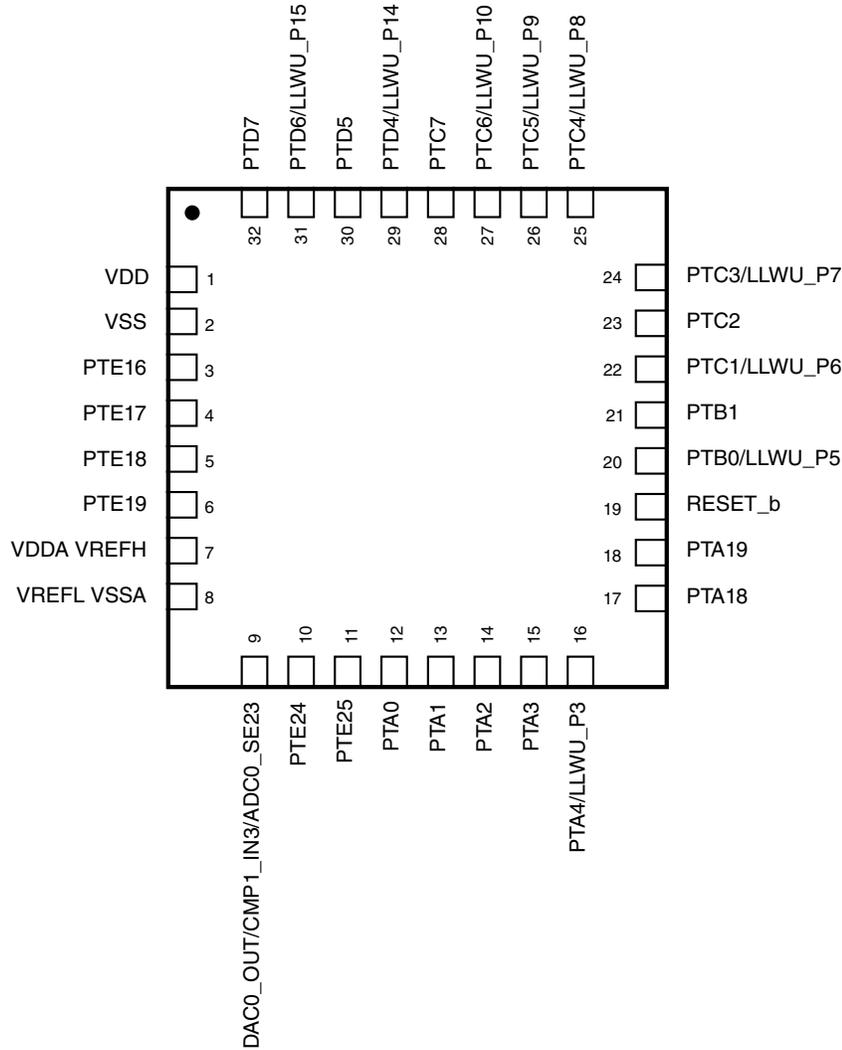


Figure 25. KV30F 32 QFN pinout diagram (Transparent top view)

## 7 Terminology and guidelines

### 7.1 Definitions

Operating behavior	<p>A specified value or range of values for a technical characteristic that are guaranteed during operation if you meet the operating requirements and any other specified conditions</p>
Typical value	<p>A specified value for a technical characteristic that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Lies within the range of values specified by the operating behavior</li> <li>• Is representative of that characteristic during operation when you meet the <a href="#">typical-value conditions</a> or other specified conditions</li> </ul> <p><b>NOTE:</b> Typical values are provided as design guidelines and are neither tested nor guaranteed.</p>

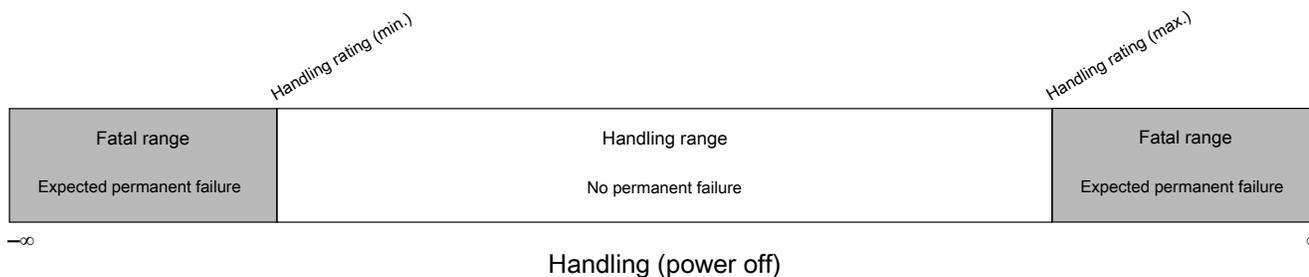
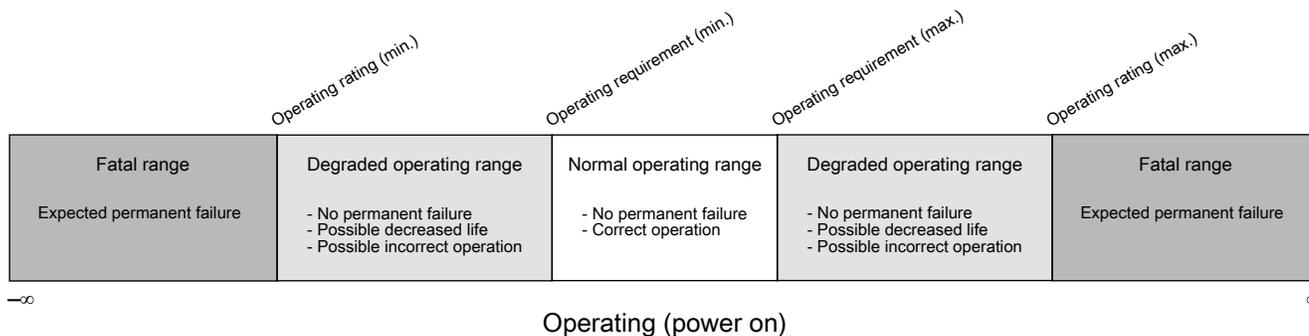

## 7.5 Guidelines for ratings and operating requirements

Follow these guidelines for ratings and operating requirements:

- Never exceed any of the chip’s ratings.
- During normal operation, don’t exceed any of the chip’s operating requirements.
- If you must exceed an operating requirement at times other than during normal operation (for example, during power sequencing), limit the duration as much as possible.
